

#### CITY OF URBANA APPROVES NH PLANS

The Fraternity cleared a major hurdle this year in our property development efforts. We received approval from the City of Urbana for our development plans for our two lots. Our plans were unanimously approved by the City. The City committee members and staff that we worked with us commended the Fraternity for its well thought out plans and our willingness to work with the neighborhood to address the residents' concerns.

Now that we have cleared the zoning hurdle we are now moving on the other challenges in this process. We need to determine if the project is financially

feasible and if a new house is in the best interest of the Fraternity. The total cost of the new building project is estimated to be nearly \$2 million dollars. Some of these funds will come from alumni donations, some will come from debt, and some will come from the small level of investments we now have. Figuring out what level of giving we can expect from the alumni for this project is one of our first steps in determining if the project is feasible. We will be talking with alumni to gauge your interest in the project and the level of contributions that you might be willing to make. Once we have the alumni portion of the financing estimated we can see how much debt the Fraternity might have to take on to complete the project and determine the overall financial feasibility of the project.

While the financial portion of the property development project is important, it is also critical for us to look at how a new house might impact the Active Chapter. How will the new house impact recruitment? What will happen to the house bills? How will the culture of the house change? What will happen to the Active Chapter during construction? We will be working with the alumni and the Active Chapter to gain answers to these and other important questions before we proceed too far down the development path.

Please contact me or any of the other Board members if you have any questions or comments on the property development efforts. Your Fraternity Board members are Mike Kinate, John Spangler, Jeff Ray, Brain Millard, Roger Higgs, Jerry Brookhart, Josh Daugherty, and Kraig Soltwedel.

Even though we have been spending much of our time as the Board on property development efforts, we have also been dealing with the ongoing operation of the House. This task has been made easy lately thanks to the leadership of the Active Chapter who continue to manage the House well and give me great confidence in the future of Nabor House.

## JERRY STOLLER '59 PRESENTED WITH 2009 GOOD NABOR AWARD

Jerry Stoller '59 was presented with the 2009 Good Nabor Award at the Annual Meeting festivities. As President and CEO of Stoller Group Inc., Dr. Stoller is a very worthy recipient of this award.

#### Q & A with 2009 Good Nabor Award recipient Jerry Stoller '59 of Houston, TX

#### Q: Catch us up with your career and family life developments since graduation.

**A:** After graduating from the U of I in 1959, I received a Masters Degree from Cornell University in Soil Science. This was followed by six years of employment as an agronomist by two different major fertilizer companies. As an agronomist I travelled extensively to different farm communities and fields and often assisted company sales people. The geographical areas which I covered were the Midwestern United States and the Southeastern United States.

In 1968 my family and I moved to Springfield Illinois where I established a micronutrient business for Brandt Consolidated. This was followed by establishment of the Stoller companies in 1970. In 1973, we moved to Houston, Texas and established our International Headquarters. The Stoller



Group has since established wholly owned subsidiaries which are mostly located and operate in every country in Latin America. In addition, companies are owned in Australia, the Philippines, The Republic of China, and also in India. In addition to the wholly owned subsidiaries, the company does business with distributors in the rest of the world. At the present time, the company does business in over 50 countries, and I have been fortunate enough to work in every one of these countries.

When the Stoller Group Inc. was established, the first group of products which were secondary and micronutrient products. In the early 1990's the company became involved in production and marketing of plant growth regulators. These primarily included the use of plant growth hormones and methods of application thereof. More recently, the research and development process concerning various microbes and their interaction in plant growth and plant health. The company now has worldwide sales exceeding \$120 million per year. Our ten-year company projections forecast us to be \$1 billion company by the year 2020.

My greatest area of interest is in research and development. Each year the company invests well over one million dollars per year in this effort. It has presented both an interesting and rewarding endeavor for me personally. This past year we set the world record soybean yield at 166.8 bushels which was conducted in conjunction with Texas A & M University on their research plots. This is just the beginning of our guest to conquer the epigenetic effects for plant production.

The Stoller Foundation has been established as a charitable organization. Each year a certain percentage of our company profits are deposited in the Stoller Foundation for charitable purposes. Hopefully, this will continue long after my death.

#### Q: In your opinion, what has been the biggest change in the agricultural industry since you began your career?

A: There have been two tremendous changes. On a local scale the biggest change has been the mechanization of agriculture. We have come a long way in the method of tillage, planting, and harvesting crops since I was a boy. On a worldwide scale, the biggest change has been the globalization of agriculture which is still in its infancy. Many of the industrialized countries will establish (either lease or own) large tracts of land in Africa, Northern Brazil, Eastern Europe and other areas where they will move whole populations of their farming communities and establish colonies to produce food and fiber. By doing so, they will build the infrastructure in all of these lesser developed countries in order to support future civilizations. This is going to turn out to be a monstrous effort for the improvement of the civilization and diets of all civilization.

#### Q: What were some of your reasons for choosing to live at NH?

A: I only had one reason. Ellery Knake was my vocational agriculture teacher. For 2 1/2 years after graduation from high school he pursued me to attend the U of I. He directed me towards applying and was probably influential in getting me accepted at NH.

#### Q: How did the University of Illinois and Nabor House help to prepare you for your career?

A: When I attended the U of I and lived at NH, it was my first experience of being away from home for any period of time. The mentoring and discipline that I received while living at the house were extremely important for setting my school habits and study habits; habits which I continue to utilize today. My experience at the U of I taught me about the importance of education. Among other things, knowledge is power. This should be emphasized to anybody who wants to obtain a special goal in life.

#### Q: Any words of advice for current Nabors House active chapter members?

A: My advice for all current Nabors and anybody who would accept an old man's advice would be:" When you pray, please spend more time trying to listen and less time doing the talking." Many of us are too anxious to have questions answered. Sometimes it takes a long time and patience to wait for the answer for what you are looking for in life. With enough faith, the correct answer will come. It then depends upon you to act upon the answer that you hear.

In closing, I have been a very fortunate man in life. There are not many people that have received the opportunity which has been presented to me. It was an honor to be the Good Nabor Award recipient for Nabor House. When people think about the life of Jerry Stoller I only wish that they could understand that he was given the ability to see both the "trees" and the "forest".

### ED McMillan '69 Named University of Illinois Trustee

As the University of Illinois embarks on a period of leadership transition and financial uncertainty, Nabor House alumni can take solace in the fact that one of their own will be helping to guide the University to future success. In May 2009, Nabor House alumnus Edward L. McMillan '69 of Greenville, IL was named as a new member of the University of Illinois Board of Trustees. In this role, McMillan and the other Trustees will be responsible for providing the support and leadership needed to help the University recover from the admissions scandal of 2009 and from the current financial crisis.

Shortly after McMillan joined the board, major changes in the board membership and University leadership occurred due to the admissions investigation which took place last May. According to McMillan, as a result of these changes the Board has:



- reconstituted the board membership;
- restructured the board committees;
- established new leadership responsibilities on the board committees (McMillan's roles include being a member
  of the three person Executive Committee and Chair of the new Audit, Budget, Finance, and Facilities Committee);
- accepted the resignations of the University President and Chancellor;
- named an Interim President, Dr. Stan Ikenberry (former U of I President);
- named an Interim Chancellor/Provost, Dr. Bob Easter (former College of ACES Dean);
- hired an external search firm to execute the new presidential search;
- named and staffed a Committee to Assist in the Presidential Search:
- and most recently, supported University leadership's initiative to take aggressive actions in an effort to deal
  with the financial crisis created by the Stare of Illinois's "financial difficulties."

The son of a tenant farmer in rural Bushnell, Illinois, McMillan enrolled at the University of Illinois and pledged Nabor House. By joining his older brother Ken (NH Class of '66.5) at Nabor House, McMillan fulfilled his need for an affordable housing option and a "home away from home for a farm kid." During his four years at NH, McMillan says he "came to appreciate the Christian base and the cooperative, fraternal spirit of Nabor House." While at NH McMillan served as pledge class president, house president, and on the executive committee. On the University level he was a member of the University Centennial Committee and a finalist for the Outstand Senior in the College of Agriculture. When asked about his favorite Nabor House memory, McMillan remembered the first fall exchange with 4-H House in 1967 where he met a young co-ed named Judy Schaufelberger, who would later become his wife. He continued that "numerous ice cream parties come in a distant second!"

After graduation, McMillan spent nearly 28 years with the US animal feed company Purina Mills, including the last eight years serving as President and CEO. Since retiring in the mid-1990s, he has been providing transaction consulting (M&A) to companies in food and agribusiness industries. He serves on two public and four private corporate boards of directors, and is Chair of the Research Park LLC for the University of Illinois.

McMillan says the principles he learned at Nabor House helped form the foundation for a successful professional career. He commented that "being a Nabor and learning to live in a Christian based, cooperative, fraternal environment is excellent preparation and training for whatever direction one might take in life... back home to farm or to become CEO of a major corporation." He continued that "the U of I education, and the contacts and associations which go along with, are more valuable and significant than anyone can possibly understand while in college or even immediately after graduation." In his case, he credits former Associate Dean Warren Wessels (NH Honorary Member) with helping him find a summer internship with Ralston Purina Company which ultimately led to a business career which he did not even imagine growing up. "The U of I provides opportunities that are only as limited as one's imagination and desire to study, explore, work, and seek opportunities to apply themselves," McMillan said.

During his career, McMillan states that the biggest change in the agricultural industry has been technology: "From computer technology, with all its capacity, speed, and efficiency of process, access, and retention, etc; to genetic technology, with genetic modification, cloning, genetic markers, DNA mapping, etc; to robotic technology, with manufacturing automation, GPS driven application and harvest, online/real time sampling and testing, etc; and information technology, with instant access to markets, data, communications, transactions globally, etc. Technology must continually expand to enable us to meet the food needs of an exploding global population!"

McMillan and his wife Judy have been married 40 years and live on a lake near Greenville, IL (Judy's home community). They have two children. Son Kyle (Illinois Ag Econ BS '97) and his wife Jodi (Illinois Ag Ed '96) live near Ohio, Illinois with their eight year old daughter Lauren. Kyle is NutriDense National Sales Manager, the corn seed genetic design business of BASF. Jodi is a full time mom and a teacher's aide in Princeton. Daughter Kelly (Texas A & M, Ag Bus '00) and her husband Brian McComb (U of Minn. DVM '02) live near Willmar, MN with

their two your old daughter Claire. Kelly is a full-time mom and is starting a consulting business after nine years in marketing and product/brand management with Elanco Animal Health and Jenni-O/Turkey Store. Brian is a veterinarian for Jenni-O/Turkey Store.

Despite a busy personal and professional career, McMillan stayed involved with Nabor House by serving on the Fraternity Board and in advisory capacities. As he sees it, this volunteer role "is a little bit of repayment to the House for all it has done for me during my time at the U of I and in subsequent years." In 1992 he was presented with the distinguished Good Nabor Alumni Award for achievements in his post-college career. In addition to his new role on the Board of Trustees, McMillan has also represented Nabor House as an advisor to the U of I Ag Econ and Animal Science Departments, and to three different U of I College of Ag/ACES Deans. He has been a member of the College of Ag/ACES Alumni Association board of directors, a member and Chair of the University of Illinois Alumni Association board of directors and a member of the U of I Foundation board of directors. "While I have not sought specific ways to be of service, I have taken the call to fulfill these various volunteer roles and have enjoyed the opportunity to be of service and hopefully add value to my Alma Mater," McMillan says.

When asked about advice to current Nabors, he encouraged them to take advantage of all the opportunities the House and the University provide. He stressed the importance of finding a career direction early in your time at the University; perhaps as the result of work experiences like a summer internship, work experiences while in college, or work experience in your home area. "The sooner you have a career in mind, the sooner your 200, 300 and 400 level courses will begin to mean something significant in their potential application to your life and your future career," he said. He encouraged house members to take advantage of activities on campus which further develop their leadership skills, interpersonal relationship skills (both social and potential career related), and potential contacts and relationships which may assist them in finding a job or expanding their network during and after college. He also stressed the value of "experiential activities" provided by some clubs/organizations on campus and as a part of some career related classes. "While you are busy during your time in college" McMillan said, "you will have more time to take part in these activities and experiences during college that you will during the first 10-15 years after you start your career and your family."

McMillan commented that it is "an honor and privilege to serve as a Trustee of the University of Illinois. I hope to provide the support and leadership needed to help the University recover from the admissions scandal of 2009 and from the current financial crisis which will not go away quickly. The U of I is a world class, global institution of higher education, research and service. The U of I developed and maintained an exceptional global reputation from its humble beginnings in the 1867 as a result of President Lincoln's Land Grant Vision to today's recognition as both a high quality and best value public University. That reputation will be retained and enhanced as a result of the continuing efforts by all involved... including the Board of Trustees."

## SCHOLARSHIP IN MEMORY OF ELLERY KNAKE '49 ESTABLISHED

A scholarship has been established at the Nabor House Educational Foundation in memory of Dr. Ellery L. Knake '49, who passed away on March 1, 2009. This scholarship was created by fellow Nabor House alumnus Dr. Jerry H. Stoller '59 to commemorate the impact that Dr. Knake has on his career. All active chapter members of Nabor House who demonstrate outstanding academic promise and initiative and the ability to become industry leaders will be eligible for this scholarship, with preference given to applicants who demonstrate substantial financial need. The first Dr. Ellery L. Knake Memorial Scholarship recipient will be announced at the 2010 Nabor House Annual Meeting.

Ellery L. Knake was born Aug. 26, 1927 in Gibson City, IL. After high school, he served his country in the Army from 1945 to 1946. He then entered the University of Illinois, where he received his B.S. in Agriculture Education with Highest Honors in 1949 and his M.S. in 1950. As an undergrad, he lived at Nabor House Fraternity and served as Vice President and was on the Executive Board. He married Colleen "Connie" Mary Wilken on June 23, 1951.

Ellery was a vocational agriculture teacher at Barrington, IL Consolidated High School from 1951-1956. He then returned to the University of Illinois to pursue a Ph.D., which he received in 1960. He then began a long and distinguished 30-year career as an Agronomy Professor at the University of Illinois.

Dr. Knake was one of the first scientists to spearhead sustainable agriculture by finding ways to reduce the need to till. As a result, he soon became an internationally recognized authority in weed science and conservation tillage. Knake demonstrated an unrivaled passion for innovation during his career as a professor of weed science and agronomy. Much of his early research centered on how to evaluate the impact of weeds on crop yields and the use of soil residual herbicides that would prevent new weed establishment without tillage.

Knake's work involving crop yields, economics, the environment and the measurement of weed populations was an early precursor to integrated pest management (IPM) techniques that have become a mainstay of modern agriculture. During his career, he served on various national committees and as editors of weed science magazines, and received awards too numerous to mention. When he passed away on March 1, 2009, Dr. Knake left behind a body of work that has made a lasting impact on both agriculture and weed science around the globe.

When asked why he created this scholarship, Dr. Jerry Stoller said "First and foremost, Ellery was a good man. Second, Ellery was responsible for me leaving home and attending the University since neither of my parents studied beyond the eighth grade." Dr. Stoller was a high school student in Dr. Knake's vocational agriculture class in Barrington, IL. It was Dr. Knake who encouraged Dr. Stoller to attend the University of Illinois and live at Nabor House, and thus created the spark that allowed Dr. Stoller to develop a career that has led to the creation of Stoller, Inc. Dr. Knake was a truly wonderful person who had

an impact on countless farmers, scientists, and researchers around the globe. Through this scholarship Dr. Stoller ensures that all future members of Nabor House will gain an understanding of the life and impact of Dr. Ellery L. Knake. "Ellery Knake made a tremendous contribution to agriculture in Illinois and in the area of weed science. He deserves to have somebody establish a memorial so that he can serve as an example to those who follow," Dr. Stoller said.

#### ROD STOLL '89 RECOGNIZED FOR SERVICE AS CHAPTER ADVISOR



In May 2009, Rod Stoll officially retired as Advisor for the Illinois Chapter of Nabor House. Having served informally since 1997 and formally since 2001, Rod has been a mentor to hundreds of Nabors. His thoughtfulness, unlimited energy, and friendly demeanor made "Uncle Rod" the first stop for many a Nabor looking for advice, counseling, or just someone to listen. Add in Rod's unique personality and never-ending catch phrases and three-letter-acronyms (TLAs), and every Nabor has a favorite story of Rod's impact in their house experience.


